

You will need:

Old wooden picnic table Sandpaper Resene Moss & Mould Killer Garden spray Resene Timber and Deck Wash Bucket Stiff-bristled brush Sandpaper

Resene StainLock waterborne stain sealer Paintbrushes (including a medium sized artists' brush to paint gaps between wooden slats) Resene Enamacryl tinted to Resene Gorse, Resene Feijoa, and Resene Shocking. Low tack masking tape

TOP TIP

Because this wooden table had been previously stained, we used Resene StainLock to prime the surface but if your table is bare timber, use Resene Quick Dry instead. If in doubt, consult the staff at your nearest Resene ColorShop.

ANOTHER IDEA...

For a subtle, contemporary look, paint your picnic table with a combination of Resene Tea, Resene Half Tea and Resene Quarter Tea.









Step 2

surface of the picnic table with a stiff-bristled brush. brush. Rinse thoroughly with clean water and allow to dry.

Step 3

In a bucket, mix one part Resene Timber and Deck Sand the picnic table to remove any loose paint Apply one coat of Resene StainLock to the entire table Wash with four parts clean water and scrub into the or wood stain and remove any sanding dust with a and allow to dry.







Step 5

two hours for each coat to dry.

Step 6

Turn the table upside down and paint the underside Turn the table the right way up and paint every third Mask off the edges of the painted slats, as shown, and legs with two coats of Resene Gorse, allowing slat with two coats of Resene Gorse. Again allow two with low-tack masking tape. hours for each coat to dry.

Step 8

Paint the alternate remaining slats with two coats of Resene Shocking, allowing two hours for each coat Feijoa. Again, allow two hours for each coat to dry.

Step 9

Paint the remaining slats with two coats of Resene

Step 10

Carefully remove the masking tape before the paint dries.
