

Daisy vase



★★★ Difficulty level ★easy ★★moderate ★★★challenging

Resene kids art with Mark Rayner - 110



You will need:

- Clean cloth
- **Old ceramic teapot**
- Paintbrushes (including a small artists' brush)
- Resene Multishield+ (gloss)
- Resene Waterborne Smooth **Surface Sealer**
- Resene testpots of Resene Alabaster, Resene Broom and Resene Niagara
- Sandpaper



Step one

Lightly sand the outside of the teapot with sandpaper and then wipe off any sanding dust with a clean cloth - this will help the paint to stick.



Step four

Paint the centre of the daisy with two coats of Resene Broom and allow two hours for each coat to dry.



Step two

Apply one coat of Resene Waterborne Smooth Surface Sealer to the outside of the teapot and allow to dry.



Step three

Apply two coats of Resene Niagara to the outside of the teapot, allowing two hours for each coat to dry.



Step five

Paint the daisy petals with two coats of Resene Alabaster. Again, allow two hours for each coat to dry.



Step six

To make the teapot nice and shiny, apply one coat of Resene Multishield+ and allow to dry. How neat is that?

It's easy to create this fabulous daisy vase from an old teapot and a few Resene testpots.



Top tip:

You can also make a vase in the same way using a plastic or glass teapot.
