With a reputation for lively, vivid drama to maintain the BCNZ has turned to Resene Paints to assist in providing a real-life period look to its Hollywood-style back lot in the hills north of Wellington.

It was Resene Paints that gave the colour—literally—to Mason's Valley, the home of Country GP.

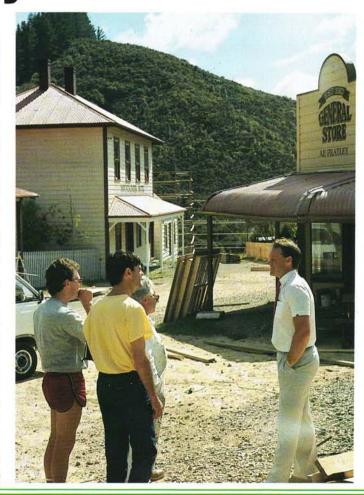
Now, Resene is assisting broadcasting set designers in going back still further into the mists of time.

Colour posed many additional technical problems for television... not the least of which was the decoration of sets. The solid-looking living rooms seen on Close To Home, for example, were little more than painted and wallpapered slabs of hardboard, slotted together for the two days a week it took to film the programme.

for the two Television channels throughout the country.

It all began when TV One's then Staging Supervisor hired a tinting machine from Resene. Resene was the first company to provide a tinting machine for British Standard Specification colours, which are those accepted world-wide in the colour television industry.

The association grew and Resene's chief chemist, Colin Gooch was approached to develop a studio floor paint . . . for the many programmes produced at TV One's large main recording studio (the biggest in the Southern Hemisphere). Floor paint must be able to be washed off as soon as a scene is recorded.

A further link developed when TV One launched its most ambitious and expensive series. It was the Grey series . . . the life of Sir George Grey in New Zealand . . . and the set designers spared no efforts to faithfully reproduce the era. From copies of the original wallpaper design in Sir George Grey's residence, Mason Handprints were able to produce a matching, authentic period wallpaper.

Mason's Valley is now being transformed into the town of Jessop for the new drama Fire Raiser.

This drama is set in 1915 and is designed for both children and adults.

As with Mason's Valley, on the television screen at least, you can't tell Jessop from a real town.

One reason is that the set and design staff are using Resene Paints to give the new village a real-life aura.

Now, more Resene products than ever are required as the village of Mason's Valley evolves into the town of Jessop.

An observatory, necessary for the plot has been built and some stables, also a plot essential, are being built.

The essence of the process has been to "age down" the buildings to fit into their new period format.

Resene's association with Country GP began with the BCNZ set supervisor Norm Cook who was responsible for applying Resene as the surface coating to the set of Mason's Valley.

Now, as Mason's Valley grows older and bigger, Resene Paints are again being used to give the mythical settlement an authentic, real life appearance.

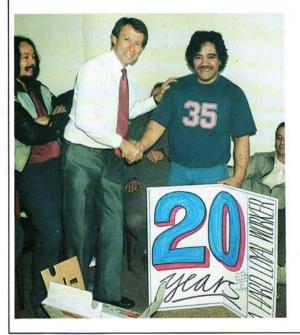

Resene at Clyde Dam

Floors at the huge Clyde Dam are being finished with Resene Paints.

Resene Paints Water Based Epoxy has been chosen as the finishing for all floors in the generating and control rooms.

Work has been carried out by Ministry of Works painters using the special Resene Aquapoxy.

Power House structural steel portals are being coated with Resene Inorganic Zinc Chlor Rubber followed by HiGlo Acrylic.

The stairs in the Power House have been coated with Inorganic Zinc and Hi Glo Acrylic.

The dam is the largest concrete dam to be built in New Zealand. It will produce its first power in 1988 from four 108 Megawatt generators.

The contract is being supervised by the Ministry of Works.
