

You Wouldn't Recognise it, Walter

This year's Resene calendar features a modernistic impression of the Resene building frontage at Naenae, painted by Christchurch artist Alison Ryde.

It's a far cry from the bland building opened by Prime Minister Walter Nash in 1958 for Philips Electrical (left). Many of the first television sets sold throughout the country were made here in the 1960's.

The building was bought by Resene in 1992 and has since been refurbished and reequipped throughout, consolidating the majority of the Wellington manufacturing and corporate office activities on one site.

The dramatic entrance-way is well captured by Alison and its real-life profile is a striking feature of the Hutt Valley landscape.



Uracryl's Up and Down Ride

The roller coaster track and superstructure at Rainbow's End fun park at Manukau City has a new shimmery, shiny surface - the result of a painstaking maintenance and recoat job by Programme Maintenance Services.

The preparation work involved sandblasting with spot priming using Resene Ameron High Build Aluminium Epoxy Mastic followed by two coats of white Uracryl 403 Acrylic Urethane. This provides a high impact and abrasion resistant finish ideal for this popular attraction.




Otago Hues Highlighted at Millbrook Resort

A 'truly international' recreational resort - that was the quality image desired by the creators of the Millbrook Resort near Arrowtown. And it was an image which had to extend to every detail of the complex's facilities, including the interior and exterior finishes of all buildings.

Faced with a massive project of international standards, contractor Ken Thompson, from Queenstown, turned to Resene. X200 was used on all building exteriors with interiors in Resene Zylone Sheen, Lusta Glo Semi Gloss Enamel and Paint Effects Medium in country-style hues.

The result is an effect that fits perfectly with the designers' brief: buildings which reflect the lifestyle and heritage of early central Otago.



Fiji's National Heritage Well Protected

More than 600,000 roof shingles finished in Resene Timberstain provides the crowning glory to Fiji's new Parliament house.




Watertight Job at Carterton


