# Methods and material for containment and cleaning up

Minor Spills	Clean up all spills immediately. Control personal contact with the substance, by using personal protective equipment. Clean area with large quantity of water to complete clean- up.

Wear appropriate personnel protective equipment and clothing to prevent exposure. Avoid breathing in mists or vapours and skin or eyes contact.
