



ur homes don't just reflect our taste: they can also shape and cater to our emotions. That can open the door to bolder choices in colour and pattern.

A touch of colour

Rich toasty colours with a muted finish create rooms designed for relaxing. Try a deep brick red, such as Resene Incarnadine, or a mustard gold, like Resene Mai Tai. In neutrals, look for off-whites like Resene Sandcastle to reduce light reflection, says Resene Colour Expert Amy Watkins. "Try taking a pastel colour like Resene Bud from the walls onto your ceiling, which changes the way the light bounces around the

room for a cocoon effect," she says. Or try colour-drenching by using one bold tone on everything for a totally immersive experience.

Versatile terracotta is also back on trend. Try Resene Tuscany or Resene Alert Tan. Other spicy tones are heroes when it comes to warmth, in shades like Resene Espresso and Resene Redwood.

Dark colours are a more obvious choice to create your cocoon. Opting for 'off-blacks' such as brown-edged tones like Resene Bokara Grey or Resene Kia Kaha, stops spaces from becoming overwhelming. Blackened greens like Resene Welcome or Resene Off The Grid evoke the serenity of a forest.

Soothing shapes and shades

Curved silhouettes are in. They're showing up in furniture such as plump sofas, in round coffee and dining tables and in the rounded corners of sideboards and kitchen islands. And even on our walls, thanks to the versatility of paint and a little artistic ingenuity.

Curves are comforting - like a hug whereas straight lines can make a space look hard-edged and too buttoned-up. Adding organic shapes and circles to your walls is as easy as using a wavy line with one colour painted above and one below. Or paint on arches or circles. Painting a wall design might seem like a daunting task, but it's more manageable than you might think. Employing a freehand technique with a pencil can yield impressive results. Begin by experimenting with sketches on paper to refine the shape and dimensions of the paint sections. Or instead of painting a mural, trace and cut shapes out of a patterned or textured Resene wallpaper and paste them onto your walls.

Soothing shades can also help soften spaces and make them feel cosy and inviting, without going for darker 'cocoon' colours. Softer, more muted shades include Resene Upside and Resene French Grey.

Blues are particularly soothing and softer watery aqua tones, like Resene Ashanti, work particularly well with greyed-edge or oaty whites like Resene Half Sea Fog or Resene Quarter Drought for an elegant, classic look that still exudes comfort.

If you're stuck getting started choosing your cosy colour scheme talk to the colour experts at your local Resene ColorShop.

Bold botanicals

Botanical prints are always popular, coming in a range of designs. For cosiness, look for Resene wallpapers in earthy colours such as soft brown and deep cream.

As these are a reflection of nature they often create the feeling of calm, says Amy, who lists Resene Smashed Avocado and Resene Wabi Sabi among her current favourite Resene greens.

Current wallpaper trends embrace the whimsical to recreate child-like wonder in nature. Designs like Resene Wallpaper Collection 465327 evoke nostalgia and the joy of falling autumn leaves. H

Nothing can change the mood of a room as quickly and effectively as paint.

e've taken one bedroom and given it four unique looks to evoke different feelings: uplift, inspire, hibernate and retreat. It's a great way to see just how a different colour scheme can completely change a room.

Resene Colour Expert Meryl Southey suggests also thinking about lighting and sheen levels. "Lower sheen paints, such as Resene SpaceCote Low Sheen or Resene SpaceCote Flat, create a warmer feel, while higher sheen finishes attract more attention."

For a bedroom perfect for hibernating in, try rich, deep natural tones and subtle texture. It evokes the feeling of being in a forest. Accessories and bedlinen are kept simple and natural, while the dark floor stained with Resene Colorwood Shade grounds the room.

For an uplifting, mood-boosting room, try muted, earthy greens for serenity and a sense of optimism. We've gone for a tonal look where the same shades are echoed around the room in furniture, flooring and accessories. Subtle notes of warm gold add contrast.

Need help finding your interior design style? Or to narrow down your choices? Either way, it can be inspiring seeing what others have done in their homes.

e've collected looks we love from the Resene Total Colour Awards entrants that are functional and modern, yet timeless.

Smart storage

Innovative storage solutions are becoming an increasingly important part of any home makeover – or new design. The way we use our homes has evolved a lot in recent years and the search is always on to find clever storage ideas.

Can you turn a living or study area wall into floorto-ceiling storage? In a large room, consider painting the wall in a contrasting colour to make it a centrepiece. In smaller spaces, paint the storage and shelving the same shade as the walls so it recedes more from the eye and creates a seamless finish.

Resene Colour Expert Jackie Nicholls says paint is the simplest way to transform storage solutions. "If you need shelves on a wall, consider painting a strip or shape of colour on the wall behind them," she suggests. This will 'embed' the shelves more into the overall design of the room and draw the eye to items on the shelves. Try a bold shade like Resene Tuscany against neutral walls, or go for a subtler change like softer Resene Awaken against walls in Resene Meringue.

Colour connections

Careful and intentional use of colour can be a helpful way of connecting different spaces in your home.

Jackie suggests repeating colours in different areas, in varying strengths, to emphasise connections between spaces.

"You may have chosen a beautiful moody colour like Resene Epic for the walls of a media room or library, which could look amazing repeated on a pantry wall with shelves or a small powder room ceiling.

"It looks cohesive when you see a small selection of feature colours echoed throughout a home. Accent colours can also draw you into a space by following around a corner from one room to another."

Try to follow the 'rule of three' and use your accent colour in at least three places in your space to help it feel like it belongs.

Think about how surfaces visually layer over each other when looking at connecting spaces. Layering a bold feature colour like burnt orange Resene Thunderbird among those layers — particularly if they're in a neutral like Resene Eighth Sisal - is a fun way to link from, say, a hallway to the rear wall of a connected bedroom.

Layering neutrals can also connect spaces, particularly in long hallways or landings where you want to create a sense of light and airiness. For added brightness try contrasting neutrals like pale cream Resene Orchid White against soft camel Resene Quarter Canterbury Clay.



The trend for bursts of bright colour or patterned wallpaper has evolved beyond feature walls. Try this anywhere from closed-off media rooms or bathrooms to shelf linings, wardrobe and cupboard interiors or ceilings, floors and doors.

If you're unsure about just what colour or pattern to use – and where – Resene stylist Monuean Ryan suggests working with the colour experts at your local Resene ColorShop, who can arm you with an array of colour options, as well as tips and advice.

"Take along all your inspiration and ideas, as well as your measurements and photos of your space for the best advice for your project."

Resene Colour Expert Meryl Southey says it's worth remembering that a pop of unexpected colour doesn't have to be a vivid bright. "A colour surprise can also be subtle, like a pastel-pink Resene Half Pale Rose ceiling in a room with moody Resene Gravel walls."

Adding a hand-drawn or traced mural to a section of wall is an impactful way to personalise a space.

Jackie's tips for creating a mural are to ensure you get your proportions right by drawing a scaled-down version of your artwork on paper first.

"Then draw a grid over your design and scale that onto the wall to make it easy to position your artwork. Draw it on first with chalk or a soft pencil before you commit to paint," she says.

"If you're not so comfortable freehand painting, there are many effects you can do with masking tape and mini rollers."

My use of dusky violets is inspired by my neighbour's flowering myrtle trees and adds colour to the room for both night and day use. Adding green to the palette adds warmth and complements the violet tones, while the lighter artwork adds lightness and contrast.

I wanted to visually soften the room with a Hamptons-esque look. I added a sense of height by replacing the board and batten with plywood lengths, strong enough to support the weight of the television, while adding visual texture. From this perspective, I have imagined the main sofa moved to the unseen wall opposite the television and added floor cushions to accommodate extra lounging. I like multifunctional spaces and furniture so I've added built-in MDF custom cabinetry to match the wall. Keeping it off the ground adds a sense of space. I also like that the Samsung Frame TV works as art when not in use. The sliding barn door makes the room really user-friendly, as it can be easily closed off for an intimate, quieter viewing experience.

Breathing new life into much-loved or unused spaces is an easy way to make the most of what you have by reusing and upcycling surfaces and possessions.

Painted-over textured surfaces like brick, concrete, or linoleum can lend your home new life. Melamine kitchen and bathroom cabinetry, ceiling tiles or wooden floorboards are all surfaces that can benefit from a fresh coat of paint and achieve maximum impact for minimal effort.

Meryl says that opting for a dramatically different colour can often provide the most significant change when upcycling or redecorating.

"If you have a deeper, darker shade in your room, try changing it to a light neutral like Resene Half Tea. It can make your space feel immediately brighter and bigger. Says Resene Colour Expert Brenda Ngatai: "Neutral wallpapers are always a winner. They give another dimension to the design of a space, they soften the walls, give low-impact texture and give a calmness to the space."

Some wallpapers also carry different sheen levels or textures, which add depth to even neutral colourways. Anaglypta wallpapers like Resene Wallpaper Collection RD920 offer a pattern or texture that can then be painted with your chosen Resene paint colour.

While neutrals are a popular go-to choice, wallpaper colours that are rising in popularity are "very much bronze, golds and brown tones, with dark earthy blues or greens, pinks and/or greys as the contrast," says Brenda.

These can be used as a feature wall, married with either a Resene paint colour that's inspired by the wallpaper, or with a plain wallpaper from the same collection.

Feature walls have never really fallen out of fashion and with the increase in bold highly-patterned papers and mural-style offerings like the dreamy botanicals of Resene Wallpaper Collection 538229, using one of these as an accent makes sense.

Certainly, bolder wallpapers are having more than a moment and there are plenty to choose from. For those fully embracing the look, these wallpapers are being applied to all four walls of a room.

"A bold pattern is a statement and is often great in large spaces, as it fills in voids in open spaces," Brenda says. "Be mindful of keeping a balance to the space, make sure the colourway ties in with what's already there such as the flooring and furniture."

It's also worth remembering wallpaper is not just for walls and doesn't need to be used in full drops. It can be used in small squares, circles or any other shapes -

ooking for the right wallpaper is a heady experience. Fanciful and whimsical scenes captivate us, large scale botanical prints or intricate florals enchant us, assertive geometrics catch our eye and mural-style designs tempt us.



geometric or freestyle. It can also be used on lampshades and books and to create framed artworks. It can be wrapped around drum-style side tables and stools, used to line the interior of a wardrobe or the backs of shelves or to create a classic panelled wall. how to:

Upcycle an old clipboard into a helpful to-do chart. With a pencil and a ruler, divide the board into four even square sections leaving a strip at the top and through the middle for your

title words. Mask off the sections using washi masking tape and paint each section in two coats of your favourite Resene colours. We've used Resene Deep Sea, Resene Groovy, Resene Limerick, Resene Centre Stage, Resene Butterfly and Resene Moody Blue. While the clipboard is drying, paint both sides of at least 10 wooden pegs with two coats of co-ordinating Resene colours. We've used Resene Half Limerick, Resene Spring Rain, Resene Feijoa, Resene Deep Sea, Resene Groovy, Resene Hopbush, Resene Ballerina, Resene Moody Blue, Resene Butterfly and Resene Centre Stage. When thoroughly dry, with a fine paintbrush, label the top strip with 'Daily', the middle strip with 'Weekly', the two left-hand squares with 'To Do' and the two right-hand squares with 'Done'. Mark each peg with a different chore (both sides) and clip them to the side of the 'Daily' or 'Weekly' 'To Do' boxes. When the chores are complete, the pegs can be clipped onto the 'Done' boxes.



how to:

Measure down a W90mm x D10mm x L1200mm length of pine at 90mm intervals and rule a line across at each point. Cut each line using a handsaw. Smooth off all the edges with sandpaper and wipe off sanding dust. Mask out diagonal or straight stripes on each square with Resene washi tape. Paint the exposed wood with two coats of Resene Half Black White, Resene Double Foundry (black) or Resene Japanese Laurel (green). When the paint is completely dry, peel off the tape and coat with Resene Aquaclear waterborne urethane varnish.

Tape around the entire edge of your board with washi masking tape. Next, paint the front of the board with two coats of Resene Poured Milk. When

thoroughly dry, tape stripes across the front of the board with masking tape, horizontally from left to right. Leave a tape-width space between each strip. Paint two coats of Resene Grey Chateau over the exposed pieces of horizontal board. Once dry, peel off the tape to reveal a grey and white striped board. Now tape the washi masking tape the same way as before but vertically this time, from top to bottom. Paint two coats of Resene Tuna over the exposed pieces of vertical board. Once dry, leaving the tape in place, tape another set of stripes, horizontally again from left to right with the same spacing as before. Paint two coats of Resene Double Foundry over the remaining pieces of exposed board. When dry, peel off all the tape and seal with two coats of Resene Aquaclear waterborne urethane varnish. H

f the outside of your home is looking a little rough and in need of some love, there's no time like the present to give it a refresh. The cooler months are the best time to search out the latest looks and start planning your exterior makeover. You can then break your project into smaller parts that you can work through one by one.

When it comes to choosing finishes for your exteriors, Resene Paint Expert Bryce McDermott says a good place to start is with the material your home is made of.

"Darker colours are very popular and if you want to go dark over timber with existing paint

coatings, it pays to do adhesion tests on the paint before you start. If the coatings are weak, putting a new coating over the top can cause the older coatings to blister. It's often best to strip old paint back to bare timber and start again to get the best life out of your paint job. Dark colours can cause movement of the timber as well.

Painting exteriors in winter

- Start later and finish earlier; 10am until 2pm is generally good in winter. You need to give the paint a chance to dry and cure before nightfall. In warmer weather you can start earlier and finish later.

flair all year

Creating outdoor rooms helps you use your outdoor spaces year round.

here's nothing like excellent indoor/outdoor flow to give your home a sense of scale, space and freedom. But it can get tricky when chilly, wet and windy weather strikes. A damp, cold, outdoor seating area isn't very inviting on a frosty day or evening.

To breathe new life – and use – into your outdoor areas in the cooler months, look for areas to turn into outdoor rooms and approach the design and styling just as you would your interiors.

Resene Colour Expert Meryl Southey says this means starting with the feel and function you want to achieve.

"First, decide what ambience you want and how that fits into the design and function of the space. Look at the basics of colour. Are your colours warm or cool? And what are the undertones of the neutrals? You will also need to consider the aspect of your outdoor room," she says.

Also bear in mind the colour of your property's exterior if your outdoor room is close to the house and look for places to add tonally similar colours – or a bold contrast.

Shelter is also essential when it comes to using outdoor spaces in winter, so think about staining wooden trellis screens in on-trend deep shades like Resene Woodsman Crowshead, which looks dramatic against lighter home exterior colours, such as everpopular Resene Sea Fog and Resene Black White.

Resene FX Faux Rust Effect is another unique way to add warm colour and visual texture on décor pieces like planters or trellis - and its use is sure to be a talking point.

That sounds like a great place to start planning your outdoor room!

Outdoor shower

Retreat space

You can easily turn a naturally sheltered corner of your deck or backyard into a relaxing retreat.

Fill it with soft furnishings such as cushions, bean bags and throws to add an essential layer of comfort and, of course, warmth.

The upholstery on your outdoor furniture must be weatherproof unless you're willing to pack it away when not in use. But you can add another layer of comfort with softer, plush fabrics that are simpler to store.

Wools, fake fur, chenille and velvet are especially inviting in the chill, as are deep jewel colours accented with pops of bright contrast. Add plenty of plants in pots painted in your favourite Resene colours; a great way to use up spare Resene testpots.

Fire pit

There's nothing guite like the glow of a flickering fire to lure everyone outside on a wintery night. Just look for a spot sheltered from the wind by a wall of your home, a fence or a moveable screen.

Consider painting the walls around your firepit in darker colours, such as Resene Carpe Noctem, or use Resene Woodsman Treehouse stain so the space feels drawn-in and cosy.

If an open fire is unsuitable for your yard, look at other options, such as gas braziers and the new generation of electric infrared heaters. And remember to think about lighting too. If your firepit area does not have electricity, a great range of solar outdoor lights are available. H


"Our inspiration came from the ideology of apartment living," Zlatko says. "If we could create a product that could be used in confined spaces, we could be casting a net to a large group of people."

The screen is anchored by a sturdy base, which ensures it's well-balanced and won't topple over, plus it has castors for shifting easily.

perennial Di Bold Resene paint colours inject vibrancy

into this Waikato garden, regardless of whether the flowers are in bloom or taking a seasonal break.

my loves colour. Visitors flock to her Villaleigh Gardens and Nursery in rural Waikato in spring and summer to admire the abundant and vivid flowering perennials in every colour under the sun.

Come winter, when the garden is more subdued, Amy ensures it remains a celebration of her love of colour – with the help of vibrant Resene paints and repurposed farming materials.

The 1.6 hectares of Villaleigh where Amy lives with her husband Aaron, a builder, and children Patrick, 13, and Caeley, 10, are a meandering mix of paths, lawns, trees and sprawling densely planted flower beds. Bright sculptures, colourful garden features and furniture, all painted in vibrant Resene hues, also draw visitors' eyes through the multilevelled plot and keep it looking interesting when the flowers hibernate.

"I have always loved every colour. I've never been one to say I wouldn't have 'pink' or any particular colour," Amy says. "When the perennials disappear, I still want something that catches your eye in the garden and draws a line to something else interesting."

A key feature of the garden is a large archway over a path painted in summery blue Resene St Tropaz, which is a beautiful contrast with the rich aubergine of Amy's 'Forest Pansy' tree and the stunning copper of her beech trees.

"I like bold contrast a lot. I like the paint colours to play off against the flowers rather than trying for a harmonious matching look," Amy says. "I look at other gardens that are all harmonious with matching colours, and I think they're lovely, but it just doesn't seem to be what I do."

Amy's ideas for colourful garden features are often inspired by what materials are available and what parts of the garden she wants to showcase.

Villaleigh is surrounded by farmland, so the most easily sourced materials for upcycling are often from the stockyards or parts of old fences. In one instance, she's made good use of half a hot water cylinder. Amy finds beauty in it all, repurposing resources in ways that add height and visual structure to the garden, as well as colour.

Besides the archway, three sizeable wooden foundation posts sourced from a building site have been thoughtfully placed in the elevated garden at the rear of the house, painted by Amy and her children in bold crimson Resene Rock N Roll. This colour is repeated on a bench seat in another secluded spot.

"I chose that colour because when I looked up the levels of the back garden, particularly in winter, I wanted it to link in with the colour of the Japanese maple.

"I actually cut off a branch and took it to my local Resene ColorShop. We worked with the colour charts to find the shade we thought best matched," Amy says.

The use of orange is also a standout, beginning when Amy planted an orange geum next to a purple salvia and fell in love with the mix of hues. "I immediately thought I needed to get more orange."

That came in the form of a large Modscene planter and the more recent addition of a tall table and chair set, built by Aaron from an old wooden fence and painted in vivid Resene Adrenalin. It pairs perfectly with the planter, the orange door of the children's playhouse and the surrounding purple, orange and magenta flowers.

"I do have really soft colours around in other parts of the garden as well, but there is something about those bold, bright colours that I love."

Against the bouquet of colour in the garden, Amy's home exterior is painted in soft grey Resene Iron. Inside the family home, she has opted for colours rather than neutrals, with Resene Pale Prim vellow on most walls and bolder shades such as bottomless blue Resene Madison and warm lavender grey Resene Gun Powder in living areas.

"The deep colour in the living area works well because the window in that room really frames the garden, and it draws your eye outside."

Though Amy keeps telling herself she's not adding any more new plants to her already large beds, she can't help but constantly evolve the colours and pathways to get the most from her property.

"My goal is to have a garden I like being in all year. Walking around in it every morning with my cup of tea, I still want to enjoy what I see."


"Consider the architectural design of your home, the setting, and the theme you are creating or have created inside. This will lend itself to what design, colours and plants to bring outdoors.

"Once vou've thought about what colour you might like in a room, look to the garden to see if there is a colour that can be added or repeated inside," she says.

"Our focus on wellbeing and valuing nature is bringing a trend for more colour and vegetation in our gardens, including wildflowers. That gives plenty of scope to bring accent colours in.

"If lots of colour is not your thing, complex earthy palettes, with structural elements and plenty of texture, will help to create cohesion between your home and garden. Try on-trend earthy shades such as Resene Domino, Resene Piazza or Resene Desert Sand and add timber stained with Resene Colorwood (for interiors, or Resene Woodsman for exteriors) to enhance its natural beauty."
