Notes on the development of hues for the Resene Heritage Chart by Ian Bowman

Background

The Resene Heritage Colour Charts was prepared in the early 1990s. The colour chart was based on:

- Research of paint actual colours using in situ, or thin section samples under a microscope;
- Australian, American and UK historic and recent heritage colour charts;
- Originals and facsimiles of painters guides;
- Historical research into the Nelson paint company;
- Literature searches into paint analysis (especially APT), traditional paint colours, painter's guides, colour mixing etc;
- Oral histories from painters.

Since then, I have undertaken paint analysis on a great number of buildings and many of the buildings listed below have been analysed since the Colour Chart was produced. This has reinforced that the colours on the Chart, based more on academic research than practical discoveries, were accurate and authentic heritage colours.

The following list shows the paint colours and one example of where they have been used in actual buildings. Many of the colours have been used extensively, but it is assumed that only one building per colour is required. While the age of the particular building may be slightly different to the age range suggested in the chart, the older colours continued to be used in the later periods. For example, the Palmerston North Regent Theatre, built in 1929, used a traditional dark crimson usually found in buildings of the Victorian and Edwardian period. Seven examples of paint colours suggested by research have not been found on buildings, but were included in the 1930s BS 381C and that published in "New Horizons in Colour". Research suggests that these colours were used on buildings and, as they were in a widely used colour chart of the period, it can be safely assumed that these colours are authentic to the period. My practice has been involved with few buildings from the 1930s and later and hence the dearth of examples of colours from this period. I am, however, increasingly involved with buildings from this period, and I am sure that I will find these colours.

Additional notes (2008):

Some colour names were changed in 2008 from the original colour names used. The colour hues remain unchanged.

Four additional colours were introduced to the palette in 2008 - Colonial White, Danube, Bali Hai and Copper Rust.

- Bali Hai dates from 1920s to 1950s from "New Horizons".
- Colonial White dates from 1920s and 1930s from BSS 381C.
- Copper Rust dates from 1940s and 1950s from "New Horizons".
- Danube dates from 1940s and 1950s from "New Horizons".
